The ceremony was performed by Reverend Father John

Miles in the Archbishop's Palace of the Holy Rosary Cathedral at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 20th, 1942. Only members of the immediate family and a few very close friends were present.

Misty rose silk crepe in afternoon length modelled the bridal frock, the finely tucked bodice with its high neckline featuring a waist length fitted jacket self-embroidered and fastened with a row of self-covered buttons. Sleeves were three quarter length and the skirt flared from a gored hipline. Mrs. Ferguson attended the Parkhill and Bornish Catholic School and also High School moving with her family to Vancouver in 1919. She is a graduate of Pitman's College and for the 17 years has been on the executive staff of one of the largest wholesale and retail stationery houses in Vancouver.

Former Parkhill Boy Married in Vancouver


